DESCRIPTION

Specialized clinical experiences in the evaluation and treatment of inpatients at UC Irvine Medical Center who have a mixture of psychiatric and medical problems. Assignment to a housestaff preceptor for weekly discussion sessions. Included in the discussions will be: psychiatric consultation procedures; interview techniques; issues of differential diagnosis, pathogenesis, and etiology; how to write consultation notes; diagnostic considerations in the medical setting; and other pertinent topics. Attendance at all consultation rounds and conferences.

PREREQUISITES

Basic science curriculum, and Psychiatry Clerkship, Extramural students must be in their final year of undergraduate medical education.
