DESCRIPTION

Students will spend most of their time with microscopic examinations. The student will have the opportunity to review selected study sets available in the Dermatopathology Laboratory. He/she will participate, to a limited extent, in actual case sign-outs and will help the dermatology resident gross tissue specimens for subsequent microscopic examination. Conferences to be attended include weekly basic science teaching conference and biweekly dermatology grand rounds. Biweekly conferences that are optional include multispecialty skin tumor board. Some time will also be available for reading or optional attendance at a morning dermatology clinic. Writing a brief case report for publication is encouraged.

PREREQUISITES

This course is intended only for 4th-year students who have completed the 620A&B electives, have experience in dermatology and/or pathology, have a special interest in dermatopathology, and are enrolled in the medical education program at University of California, Irvine School of Medicine (UCISOM).

COURSE DIRECTOR
